Dana Rupe, Director, Iowa JPEC

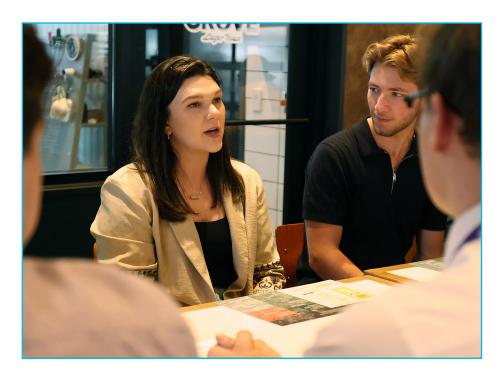
Dana Rupe, an entrepreneurial leader with more than 20 years of experience launching and scaling businesses, began as director of the University of Iowa John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center on June 9, 2025.

A native of Eddyville, Iowa, Rupe, brings a strong track record building and scaling apparel and sports brands. Her portfolio includes founding and leading ventures such as the women's activewear brand Alex + Abby and Daden Group, an apparel licensing vehicle for the industry. Rupe also co-founded Valley Apparel, which became

a key licensing partner with adidas, for the National Football League (NFL), Major League Baseball (MLB), the National Basketball Association (NBA), and more than 300 collegiate teams. After the company was acquired by adidas, she served as vice president of its team division, leading product development, international sourcing, and sales.

At the University of Iowa, Rupe recently served as an adjunct instructor, teaching social media marketing for fashion and lifestyle brands in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication. A frequent guest lecturer and mentor, she is dedicated to creating experiential learning opportunities that connect students with the real world of entrepreneurship.

UI Students Turn \$20 Class Project into \$6,000 Donation for Children's Hospital

Five University of Iowa students turned a \$20 class project into a \$6,000 donation for the Stead Family Children's Hospital.

Their venture, Koozies for a Cause, sold black-and-gold sleeves with "Wave to the Brave," honoring patients in the Hawkeye football tradition. The idea began in Bob Walker's entrepreneurial finance course, where teams launch businesses with \$20. Students Jaelyn Boley, Natalie Noonan,



Jacob Sommer, Jackson Glenn, and Jared Weeks sold koozies for \$5–\$8, reordering twice, and donated all profits and remaining stock to the hospital.

On Nov. 11, 2024, they presented a \$6,000 check to support families. With an 82% profit margin—surpassing past projects—they showed how small ventures can make a big impact.

Classroom Idea Becomes \$50K for Families

University of Iowa graduate and NFL star Micah Hyde partnered with a UI business class to host a charity golf outing in summer 2025, raising \$50,000 for families at the Stead Family Children's Hospital.

The idea began in Hyde's college days in a class taught by Iowa JPEC instructor Joe Sulentic. Years later, Hyde brought it to life

through his nonprofit, Imagine For Youth, with Sulentic's students leading logistics, sponsorships, and promotions.

More than 120 golfers participated, including former and current Hawkeyes Desmond King II, Jay Higgins, and Jared Clauss, showcasing the Hawkeye bond and spirit of giving back.

All proceeds supported hospital families, showing how a classroom spark can grow into meaningful community impact.

Startup Incubator

The Startup Incubator at the University of Iowa helps individuals and teams turn ideas into sustainable ventures. Participants access workspaces, mentoring, funding, workshops, marketing support, prototyping tools, software, and legal resources to meet practical startup needs. Networking with alumni and business leaders fosters connections that accelerate growth. By combining resources, expert guidance, and community support, the Incubator equips students to launch, manage, and scale ventures while gaining real-world entrepreneurial experience.

STEM Star Shines Nationally

Dasia Taylor is a University of Iowa inventor, entrepreneur, and STEM advocate from Iowa City. In Spring 2021, while a senior at Iowa City (Iowa) West High School, Taylor won first place and \$1,500 in the University of Iowa's Jacobson Institute Innovator Competition. She gained national recognition for inventing surgical sutures that change color to indicate infection. Using beet dye combined with cotton-polyester thread, her sutures respond to pH changes, providing an accessible way to detect infections early.

Taylor's invention earned her a Top 40 finalist spot in the 2021 Regeneron Science Talent Search and the Glenn T. Seaborg Award. Named USA Today's Iowa Woman of the Year, she has been featured in national media for her innovative work. At Iowa, she majors in global health studies and founded NERD STEM Box, a hands-on STEM education tool inspiring young problem-solvers and future innovators. On Aug. 20, Taylor appeared on "Good Morning America."

Startup Incubator Summer Track

The University of Iowa's Startup Incubator Summer Track gives students the chance to dedicate their summer to building a business. Over the course of the program, participants focus full-time on transforming ideas into viable ventures, supported by mentorship, guest speakers, and access to campus resources. The experience emphasizes rapid learning and hands-on execution, from developing prototypes to testing markets. Along the way, students form connections with alumni, business leaders, and peers who share their drive for innovation. By the end of the summer, participants walk away with progress on their startups and skills to carry them forward.

At the University of Iowa's Startup Incubator Pitch Competition in May, Archaneon Supplements LLC won the top prize of \$3,000 for its premium fitness supplements. Other winners included RefillerMe (\$2,000) and FLIP (\$1,000). The competition showcased student startups supported by the University of Iowa John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center.



Engineering Success: Fogarty Builds a Business at Iowa JPEC

Keegan Fogarty, a senior in mechanical engineering at the University of Iowa, is developing General Robotics, a startup software to simplify automation for manufacturers. Inspired by an internship at LCN, he aims to let engineers upload 3D models, place robots, and generate programs automatically.

Fogarty connected with the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center (Iowa JPEC) through its Startup Incubator and participated in IdeaStorm and the Innovation Challenge, winning \$10,000 in spring 2025.

Iowa JPEC helped Fogarty focus on customer needs, strategy, and market fit for General Robotics. He is now building an alpha version of the software and consulting with potential users like engineers and plant managers. Before graduation, Fogarty wants to build a team and generate revenue.

Community Outreach

Venture School

Venture School is a statewide entrepreneurial training program with cohorts in Mason City, Iowa City/Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Sioux City, Quad Cities, and online. With 67 teams and 86 participants in FY25, Venture School delivered 3,283 mentoring hours. From FY24 to FY25, the number of Venture School participants increased by 19 and the number of teams increased by seven.

NSF I-Corps

The NSF I-Corps program at lowa, led by Iowa JPEC, helps researchers, innovators, and startups explore the commercial potential of their work. Over four weeks, teams use customer discovery and the Lean Startup approach to test ideas, refine value propositions, and understand target markets. With guidance from experienced mentors, participants strengthen product development and prepare for funding from competitions, investors, and federal programs like SBIR and STTR.

NSF I-Corps Helps MedLung Make Lungs Affordable

Frustrated by the \$25,000-\$50,000 cost of lung devices, University of Iowa PhD student Emmanuel Akor founded MedLung in 2023 to create affordable alternatives priced near \$8,000. With teammates Pete Subudom and Daniel Meggo, he gained support from mentor Gregg Barcus and Iowa JPEC, earning



recognition at the Innovation Challenge and advancing through NSF I-Corps. The team has since raised more than \$100,000, including \$30,000 at the UI Ventures pitch, and is finalizing a beta prototype for testing in the College of Medicine. Aiming to serve underserved populations in Sub-Saharan Africa, MedLung plans to launch by 2026.

America's Small Business Development Center (SBDC), established in 1982 as one of lowa's four original regional centers, is part of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center (Iowa JPEC) and the Tippie College of Business. Serving businesses in Cedar, Iowa, Johnson, Poweshiek, and Washington counties, the SBDC is led by Regional Director Paul Heath, a Certified Business Advisor and C.M.A./C.P.A. The center provides tailored resources and services to small business owners, including nearly daily workshops across Iowa and monthly Lunch & Learn sessions, offering practical guidance to help entrepreneurs grow and manage their businesses successfully.

Banks Said No, But the SBDC Said Let's Go

When banks turned them away, Tom and Dianne Latimer found support from Paul Heath and America's SBDC at the University of Iowa, part of Iowa JPEC. With Heath's help, the Latimers secured SBA funding and launched Latitude Signage + Design from a rented garage in Grinnell in 1985. Today, Latitude employs nearly 100 people, generates \$40 million in annual revenue, and serves clients nationwide. The SBDC's early guidance was instrumental in navigating startup challenges, demonstrating how Iowa JPEC programs help entrepreneurs across the state grow lasting businesses rooted in hard work, innovation, and local support.

Community Outreach

Venture Mentoring Service

lowa JPEC's Venture Mentoring Service (VMS), modeled after MIT's program, connects entrepreneurs with teams of experienced volunteer mentors in confidential, conflict-free sessions. This team-based approach increases venture success through objective guidance. Launched with support from the Kauffman Foundation, lowa JPEC's VMS partners with other Pappajohn Centers statewide to foster business growth, drive economic development, and strengthen lowa JPEC's leadership in entrepreneurship education and outreach.

Business Consulting

Iowa JPEC's business consulting program offers no-cost, strategic support to alumni and lowa businesses while giving students hands-on experience. Teams of 3-5 students, guided by faculty and mentors, dedicate 120-150 hours per project each semester. Clients receive competitive analyses, expert insights, and actionable recommendations, with optional research on market trends, consumer behavior, or social media. Past projects span industries from manufacturing to biotech, covering marketing, product development, and strategy. Clients invest just 2-3 hours weekly to meet with teams and provide feedback.

Mukanga Empowers Communities Through Entrepreneurship

Freedom Mukanga, a visionary entrepreneur from Zimbabwe, received the 2025 International Business Entrepreneurship Impact Award from the Institute for International Business (IIB) and the University of Iowa John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center, honoring alumni who use entrepreneurial knowledge for community impact.

Mukanga is founder and team leader of FreedPer Scientific, transforming Africa's weather and water data systems. FreedPer generates more than \$100,000 in revenue, secured a \$1 million partnership with BancABC Zimbabwe, and benefits more than 90,000 people through forecasting, early warning systems, and STEM workshops. Mukanga also serves

on the African Meteorological Society and uses Iowa consulting resources to refine FreedPer's strategy.

A 2022 Mandela Washington Fellowship alumnus, he co-founded Hozi Innovator, mentors youth, and trains rural women in entrepreneurship. Committed to social good, Mukanga continues forging partnerships that empower communities, showing how vision and innovation create lasting impact across Africa.

Youth Innovation





DesignDash

DesignDash, a one-day entrepreneurship program, challenges high school students to form teams, develop business ideas, and present them to judges, all within eight hours. Since its launch in April 2022, DesignDash has grown significantly, with 566 students from 81 high schools participating across lowa in 2024-25.

The lowa City event in November featured 21 student teams pitching innovative business ideas, such as a local food delivery service for athletes, stress-relief products, and virtual learning platforms. Students received guidance from 23 mentors and volunteers. Participants praised the networking opportunities and the program's role in sharpening their business skills.

Educators and mentors emphasized the value of the experience, highlighting its role in fostering creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking. With strong support from schools and growing student interest, DesignDash continues to inspire young entrepreneurs. The program returned in Spring 2025, with events in Cedar Rapids, Ottumwa, and Sioux City, further expanding its impact across the state.

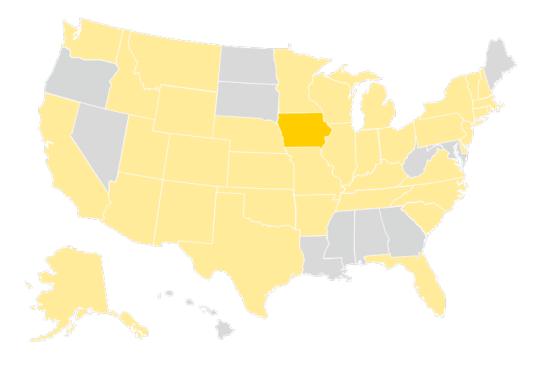
Invention Convention

lowa JPEC's Jacobson Institute has been named the official Iowa affiliate for Invention Convention Worldwide (ICW), a program of the Henry Ford Museum of American Innovation. This designation positions the institute as a leader in K-12 innovation and entrepreneurship. As the affiliate, the Jacobson Institute will partner with educators and districts to provide programming, training, and events. The Iowa Invention Convention complements the institute's KidInnovator and BizInnovator Startup curricula, giving students opportunities to solve problems and strengthen an inventive and entrepreneurial mindset.



The Belin-Blank Center for Gifted Education previously led Iowa's ICW involvement and remains an advocate for invention-based learning. With the Jacobson Institute's expanded role, Iowa students gain more opportunities to invent and create real-world solutions. During the inaugural year, 194 Iowa students from 14 schools participated. Of these, 29 students showcased their inventions on campus in April at the Tippie College of Business in April. Four students advanced to Invention Convention U.S. Nationals held in Dearborn, Michigan, and two of these young inventors came home with awards. Oliver Matalon of Cedar Rapids won two awards: 3rd Place for 2nd Grade and the Transportation Category Award for his invention Recessed Rescuer. Charles Smith of Fox Valley Academy in Ottumwa won two awards: 2nd Place for 6th Grade and the Best Video Presentation for his invention Fire C.A.V.E.S System.

Advisory Board

In 1972, Dick Ferguson's career shifted when he discovered an ACT newsletter in a Chicago hotel hallway. The article mirrored his PhD research, prompting a call to ACT and, within a day, a new job in Iowa. That chance encounter launched a 38-year career with ACT, including 22 years as CEO and chairman until his retirement in 2010.

Raised in Pennsylvania, Ferguson earned degrees in mathematics before completing his PhD at the University of Pittsburgh. When he joined ACT, the organization had only one building and 50 employees. Under his leadership, ACT grew significantly, strengthened ties with the University of Iowa, and established a \$5 million scholarship supporting graduate students, especially minorities.

Ferguson also received the Friend of the University Award and supported innovation through Iowa JPEC. Today, he continues advising startups, serving on boards like OpenLoop, and championing entrepreneurship in Iowa.
